Respiration Monitors for home use.



Respiration Monitors and Apnoea Alarms alert a baby's parent or carer should they stop breathing allowing an opportunity to give whatever assistance necessary. In extreme cases resuscitation may be required. It is therefore paramount that any person having charge of a baby is taught the proper methods. We suggest a "hands on" course with your surgery, Red Cross, or St. John's Ambulance is taken.

We do not suggest the use of any of this equipment will guarantee the life of a baby. However, it will give every opportunity of assisting when needed. Over the years, many parents we have helped have expressed the "peace of mind" the equipment we have loaned them has given.

The alarms we use are purely medical equipment and do not include baby listening devices available from many High Street retail outlets. They are loaned with the express approval of the baby's GP.



Relieving Asthma

Nebulisers for home use

Our patients, of all ages, suffer many different respiratory conditions such as asthma, brittle asthma, COPD and emphysema, to name but a few. They require both mains and portable Nebulisers to convert necessary liquid medication into a fine mist to be easily absorbed by the lungs. The medication disperses the sticky mucus which congests them allowing them, once again, to breathe freely.



Many think Nebulisers are freely available on the NHS. The reality is, in most cases, they are not. In cases where they are available the patient must travel to and from the surgery, sometimes three or four times a day, for treatment.

Our aim is simply to give our patients the opportunity of breathing, and in turn the freedom of leading as normal a life as possible despite their particular condition. Maybe, for some it's the ability to get to the shops. For others, to be able to work, or go to school. Again, all equipment is loaned both with the consent and supervision of the patient's GP.
